Overview of Adobe Photoshop

Starting to work in Adobe Photoshop

The Adobe Photoshop workspace includes the command menus at the top of your screen and a variety of tools and panels for editing and adding elements to your image. You can also add commands and filters to the menus by installing third-party software known as plug-in modules.

Photoshop works with bitmapped, digitized images (that is, continuous-tone images that have been converted into a series of small squares, or picture elements, called pixels). You can also work with vector graphics, which are drawings made of smooth lines that retain their crispness when scaled. You can create original artwork in Photoshop, and you can import images into the program from many sources, such as:

- Photographs from a digital camera
- Commercial CDs of digital images
- Scans of photographs, transparencies, negatives, graphics, or other documents
- Captured video images
- Artwork created in drawing programs



In this guide, you'll learn your way around the Adobe Photoshop workspace, how to create custom workspaces, how to open images, use the Properties panel, create new Photoshop documents, and use basic pan and zoom tools.

Introduction to the Photoshop Workspace

Workspace Overview

The *Application bar* across the top contains a workspace switcher, menus (Windows only), and other application controls. On the Mac for certain products, you can show or hide it using the Window menu.

The *Tools panel* contains tools for creating and editing images, artwork, page elements, and so on. Related tools are grouped.

The Options bar Control panel displays options for the currently selected tool.

The *Document window* displays the file you're working on. Document windows can be tabbed and, in certain cases, grouped and docked.

Panels help you monitor and modify your work. Panels can be grouped, stacked, or docked.

The Application frame groups all the workspace elements in a single, integrated window that lets you treat the application as a single unit. When you move or resize the Application frame or any of its elements, all the elements within it respond to each other so none overlap. Panels don't disappear when you switch applications or when you accidentally click out of the application. If you work with two or more applications, you can position each application side by side on the screen or on multiple monitors.

If you are using a Mac and prefer the traditional, free-form user interface, you can turn off the Application frame.

- <u>Workspace basics</u>: Learn how to navigate and use the Adobe Photoshop workspace. Use preset workspaces, or create custom workspaces by moving and manipulating windows and panels.
- <u>Create documents</u>: When you create a document in Photoshop, instead of beginning with a
 blank canvas, you can choose from a wide variety of templates from Adobe Stock. Templates
 include assets and illustrations that you can build on to complete your project. When you open a
 template in Photoshop, you can work with it just as you would work with any other Photoshop
 document (.psd).
- In addition to templates, you can also create a document by selecting one of the numerous
 presets available in Photoshop or create your custom sizes. You can also save your own presets
 for reuse.
- <u>Tools Gallery</u>: A visual introduction to the key tools in Photoshop
- <u>Use tools</u>: Learn how to access and use Adobe Photoshop tools. Also find out how to save and reuse tool settings by creating tool presets.

Color Management

A color management system reconciles color differences among devices so that you can confidently predict the colors your system ultimately produces. Viewing color accurately allows you to make sound color decisions throughout your workflow, from digital capture through final output. Color management also allows you to create output based on ISO, SWOP, and Japan Color print production standards. In this section, you will learn more about managing colors in Photoshop.

- <u>Understanding color management</u>: learn more about the color management system in Adobe Photoshop, which reconciles color differences among devices so that you can confidently predict the colors your system ultimately produces.
- <u>Keeping colors consistent</u>: learn how Adobe color management helps you maintain the
 appearance of colors as you bring images in from external sources, edit documents and transfer
 them between Adobe applications, and output your finished compositions.
- <u>Color settings</u>: learn more about working with and customizing the Photoshop color settings.
- Work with color profiles: learn how to work with color profiles to ensure precise, consistent color management.
- <u>Color-managing documents for online viewing</u>: learn how to color manage documents for online viewing.
- <u>Color-managing documents when printing</u>: learn about color profiles and color management when printing documents.

Layers

Layers are a basic building block of documents in Photoshop. In this section we point you to a series of resource that you can go through to learn how to use layers efficiently.

- <u>Layers basics</u>: Learn the basics of working with Adobe Photoshop layers. You can use layers in Adobe Photoshop to combine (or composite) multiple images, add text to an image, add vector graphic shapes, add special effects such as a drop shadow or a glow, and more.
- <u>Create and manage layers and groups</u>: Learn how to create and manage layers and groups in Adobe Photoshop.
- <u>Mask layers</u>: Learn how to use masks to hide and reveal portions of layers in Adobe Photoshop. With this valuable compositing technique, you can combine multiple photos into a single image or remove a person or object from a photo.
- Nondestructive editing: learn how nondestructive editing in Adobe Photoshop allows you to
 make changes to an image without overwriting the original image data, which remains available
 in case you want to revert to it.
- <u>Select group and link layers</u>: learn how to select multiple layers to perform activities such as moving, aligning, transforming, or applying styles. You can also link two or more layers or groups; linked layers retain their relationship until you unlink them.
- <u>Layer opacity and blending</u>: Learn how to use layer opacity and blending modes in Adobe Photoshop to create special effects.

Selections

Listed below are the sections of the user guide that will teach you how to make selections in Photoshop.

- <u>Select and Mask workspace</u>: Learn how to use a dedicated new workspace in Photoshop CC that helps you make precise selections and masks. Use tools like Refine Edge Brush to cleanly separate foreground and background elements and do much more.
- <u>Make selections</u>: learn how to select pixels to isolate parts of your image in Adobe Photoshop. Use quick selection tools, marquee tools, lasso tools, and more.
- <u>Select with the lasso tools</u>: learn how to use the Lasso tool, Polygonal Lasso tool, and the Magnetic lasso tool to easily make selections. Also learn how to set options for each to further refine your selections.
- Make quick selections: learn how to make quick selections with the Quick Selection tool or the Magic Wand tool.
- <u>Select with the marquee tools</u>: In Adobe Photoshop, learn how to make selections with the marquee tools.
- <u>Select a color range in an image</u>: learn how to select a specified color or color range within an
 existing selection or an entire image. You'll also learn how to use the Color Range command to
 save skin tone settings or later use.

Image Basics

Working with text in Photoshop

Learn how to work with type and text—characters, paragraphs, fonts, etc—in Photoshop.

- <u>Create type</u>: learn how to create type layers in Photoshop.
- <u>Edit text</u>: learn how to edit text, find and replace text, check spelling, scale, and rotate type, and perform other text editing tasks.

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- <u>Format paragraphs</u>: Learn how to format paragraphs in Adobe Photoshop. Find out how to specify alignment and justification, adjust word, letter, and paragraph spacing, indent paragraphs, adjust hyphenation, and more.
- <u>Format characters</u>: Learn how to format characters in Adobe Photoshop. Find out how to specify type size and color, apply text treatments, and use character styles.
- <u>Create type effects</u>: Learn how to create and work with type effects in Adobe Photoshop. Find
 out how to create type along a path, warp and unwarp type, convert type to shapes, add drop
 shadows to type, and more.
- <u>Line and character spacing</u>: Learn how to set, adjust, and work with line and character spacing in Adobe Photoshop.
- <u>Fonts</u>: learn about key terms and tools related to fonts.

Image Adjustments

This section covers the basics of making image adjustments in Photoshop.

- <u>Perspective warp</u>: Easily adjust perspective in images using Adobe Photoshop. You can also use this feature to composite objects having different perspectives in a single image.
- <u>Healing brush examples</u>: examples that help you make the most of image healing features in Photoshop CC.
- Adjust image sharpness and blur: learn to Use a variety of tools, filters, and masks, such as Smart Sharpen, to adjust image sharpness and blur in Adobe Photoshop. You can also use the Unsharp mask, which sharpens a photo by increasing contrast along the photo's edges.
- Reduce camera shake blurring: learn how to automatically reduce or fix image blurring caused by camera motion. Use the camera shake reduction filter in Adobe Photoshop, and adjust advanced settings to sharpen your image.
- <u>Understand color adjustments</u>: Learn about making color adjustments with tools in Adobe Photoshop to enhance, repair, and correct color, lightness, darkness, and contrast.

For more information on various image adjustments you can make such as brightness/contrast adjustments, shadow and highlight detail adjustments, level adjustments, color balance adjustments, etc. scroll down to Learn More in the Image Adjustments section of the Photoshop User Guide.

Image Repair and Restoration

Adobe Photoshop has some great tools to help you repair and restore images. Check out the links below to learn about the core techniques and tools.

- <u>Content-Aware Patch and Move</u>: Learn how to use the Content-Aware Patch and Content-Aware Move tools in Adobe Photoshop. Heal away undesirable portions of an image, or select and move a part of a picture.

Image Transformations

For the ACA exam you will also need to know how to reshape and transform images in Photoshop. Below are links to resources outlining some of the key concepts you will need to know.

- <u>Transform objects</u>: learn how to use a variety of tools and techniques to scale, rotate, skew, stretch, or warp an image. You can apply transformations to a selection, an entire layer, multiple layers, or a layer mask.

 the Crop tool to easily remove portions of a photo to create focus or strengthen the
 composition. You can also use the Crop tool to straighten photos.

- Adjust crop, rotation, and canvas size: Learn how to adjust image rotation and canvas size in Photoshop.

Drawing and Painting

In this section you will learn more about drawing- and painting-related feature in Photoshop.

- About drawing: learn more about the vector shapes and paths you use when drawing. Also find out more about the different Photoshop drawing modes.
- Modify shapes: learn how to adjust dimensions and placement of shapes, and also how to
 modify the corner radii of rounded rectangle shapes after they have been drawn, individually, or
 collectively.
- <u>Draw shapes</u>: learn how to use the Adobe Photoshop shape tools to draw all types of simple and complex shapes. The Adobe Photoshop shape tools can help you easily create buttons and other navigation graphics for your web pages.
- <u>Painting tools</u>: Learn how to work with various painting tools in Adobe Photoshop.
- <u>Create and modify brushes</u>: Learn how to create and modify brushes in Adobe Photoshop.
- <u>Blending tools</u>: Learn how to use blending modes in Adobe Photoshop.
